Religion II Class Content (narrative overview)

The Passion of God (Background Noise? or Eternal Love?: 1st Semester)

When the human family fell, God employed a myriad of ways to tell us of His intent for us. His love is revealed in the stories of Hosea and Gomer, David, Ruth and Boaz, and Christ's own Sermon on the Mount. What is He saying? What has He always said? What can we hear today? We will walk through these familiar passages to discover anew His incalculable love for us.

Passing the Passion (Acts/SDA History: 3rd Quarter)

When Christ was resurrected from the dead, so were the hearts of His followers. When the motley crew of core followers (aka disciples!) began to live out what Jesus had modeled they were transformed. Jesus became more real to them than when He walked the familiar ground with them. The world was turned upside down. The Spirit descended with power. A revolution began. The invitation to continue the legacy extends to us today. The Seventh-day Adventist church is simply a movement that draws from that rich tradition. We will take a longitudinal look at Christ in the body of believers that we are invited to join.

Galactic Struggle (Great Controversy/SDA History: 4th Quarter)

We begin the quarter with a "step back" to look at the big picture. Where is our place in the galaxy? What are the issues at stake? Why did Christ come to earth in the first place? These questions wrap around our thoughts throughout the fourth quarter. They provide an understanding of where the cosmic family has been. Where the universal family of God is headed? We close the quarter and year with a look at the revealed prophetic future. Where does the Seventh-day Adventist church fit into the Divine Plan? What can each one look forward to becoming in the grace of Christ? God has been good, God is good, and God will nurture His children forever into the future. This is the confidence we have in Christ.

Getting Organized

The student is required to have the **textbook**, **pencil**, **notebook paper**, **journal or bound paper book**, if applicable, at class each day.

The student is given an assignment sheet at the beginning of each quarter, so the assignments are known even if the student is absent. Presentations needs to be ready to present at the beginning of class, this means that you need to have it on a CD, thumb drive, or other removable media and turn it in the day before it is due.

Anytime a student is in class, the **homework** due is expected to be turned in at the beginning of class. Most times a reader grades the homework papers. Only the Instructor will see or process the Journals. Quizzes and tests are a combination of online and written (processed by a reader or teacher).

The teacher grades the journals, presentations, and tests.

The **quiz** must be taken if you are attending class, even if you were absent the day before. If you are absent on the day a quiz is given and you skipped class, then you will earn a zero grade. If you are gone a school excused trip, then you will either be asked to take the quiz (IF IT IS A MEMORY VERSE) or it will be averaged in (ANYTHING ELSE BESIDES A MEMORY VERSE).

Journal entries should be written daily. You should indicate the **section** and **date** so that when you read it, you can readily see what you are currently learning. These are your notes. The **required journal** entries must stand out easily in order to view them.

Participate when you are working together with a friend for a presentation or a cooperative learning activity. Positively participate each day in class for points. If you are a disruption, come dressed inappropriately, arrive late to class (get a tardy), miss class (are absent) or have to return to your locker for necessary class items you will lose some of your participation points for that day.

Electronic Devices Policy

If MBA has issued or provides a device (iPad/laptop) for school use, then you MAY NOT use a phone in class. If you have a personal laptop you may use it in class—IF YOU HAVE CLEARED IT WITH ME AND THE IT DEPARTMENT first. If however, you are not provided a school issued device, then the use of your phone in class is up to my discretion in class only for the use of notes, or class approved activities.

Absence Policy

First and foremost, **THERE IS NO, ABSOLUTELY NONE, NADA, NEIN, ZERO, ZIP, ZILCH, LATE WORK ACCEPTED** unless for a reason cleared with the Office. "i forgot" or "i'm not done yet" or "my pet goldfish ate it" are not valid reasons for late work. Ample opportunity for Extra Credit work is available.

Quid Pro Quo (conditions delineated):

If the student is *sick* or there is a *death* in the family, the *quiz* is *excused*. TESTS must be made up. Journals can be handed in later after a conversation with the instructor (me). Other work is averaged in.

If the student is absent because of a *school sponsored tour*, i. e. Oceanaires, Westwinds, Varsity, Junior Varsity, Mission Trip, Week of Prayer Team Trip, etc., the **quiz** will be **excused (except the MEMORY VERSE portion: this must be done BEFORE your trip).** Homework, test, portfolio, journal viewing or presentation must be done before the trip to receive credit, unless a variance has been given.

A student that is absent because of a *Pre-Arranged Absence* will **not have homework or quizzes excused**. **Positive participation points will be lost.** If the student wishes to receive credit for the homework, it must be turned in before or on the date due. A test may be made up when pre-approved and accompanied with a \$10 fee (school policy). Quizzes will receive a zero. Portfolio assignments, journal viewing or presentations must be done to receive any credit.

In the case of a *suspension*, homework and special journal entries can be accepted (teacher discretion) and if accepted the work **MUST be turned in the first day the student is back in class** (THIS POLICY APPLIES IF DEEMED BY THE ADMINISTRATION. Otherwise, work will be averaged--except memory verses). You will receive zero points for positive participation while you have been absent from class. *A test, portfolio, journal viewing or presentation must be done to receive any credit.* Quizzes will receive a zero unless a variance has been given for some other arrangement.

A student that is *unexcused* will get **no credit** for anything.

Common Classroom Courtesy

All students are to be seated when the bell rings for the beginning of class. Your homework paper is to be available to be turned in when you walk into the classroom.

Study, think, and participate in Religion class. Studying for a test in another subject, your head on the desk, distracting anyone else in the room, sleeping in class, being dressed inappropriately, not bringing your necessary class items with you or a late PowerPoint presentation will be cause for loss of positive participation points.

Behavior needs to be acceptable and not distracting to the teacher at all times. If you misbehave, you may be asked to go outside with me or you may be asked to leave and go meet with an administrator. You will lose positive participation points for the day. Here are some samples of misbehavior and not limited to: throwing anything, constant talking, disrupting anyone. **Leaving the classroom is by permission only**.

Please **do not** bring food and drink into the classroom to partake of for breakfast, lunch or snacks. **Water in a water bottle is permissible**. I will collect others. The teacher reserves the right for exceptions on a case by case basis.

Please **do not write directly on the desks**. They have had to last a long time and no doubt longer. When using computers, please **do not change the screen setups**. If found in violation, positive participation points will be lost for the day. The computers in this classroom are for educational use only. For other uses, please use one of the general school computer labs.

Refer to the Student Handbook for the dress code for the classroom. In a nutshell it is: **Take your cap off before entering the room**. **Do not wear jewelry**, especially rings, necklaces, earrings, bracelets. You will be asked to remove the jewelry and give it over to me. **Wear school clothes**, not pajamas, slippers, or bare midriffs. **Shorts** must not be gym shorts or board shorts. You will be asked to go change to proper attire if out of compliance. You will lose positive participation points for the day. You may receive a conduct slip.
